The remodeling of the Marketplace has meant we have had to be creative - we cannot do this year exactly what we have done every year for several decades. It can be very easy to become so wedded to a tradition (a particular way of doing something) that the tradition becomes more important than the symbolic act. Remembrance Sunday is not about parades and marching bands, or standards (flags), or even about civic dignitaries turning up in black coats and chains of office to lav their wreaths. All of that is tradition. The symbolic act is a nation coming together in a collective period of silent reflection, recalling those who paid the ultimate sacrifice in time of war, and committing ourselves to learn from this horrific past. In this annual act of remembering we keep before us the horror of war and commit ourselves to work for a better world, where, in the words of the prophet Micah, nation shall not lift up sword against nation.

Every year since 1945, as the nation has gathered to Remember, British troops have been deployed on operations around the world. There has only been one year since 1945 when no new names have been added to the list of British Service Personnel who have died (been killed) on active service. As I look at the world today - Russia/ Ukraine. Israel/ Palestine... Iranian involvement in both theatres of war... North Korean involvement in support of Russia - I wonder what the parallels might be with how the world felt in the mid-1930s. I wonder at what point localised conflicts may tip over into a third world war. War has been with us since earliest times but, as the renowned military theorist Carl von Clausewitz wrote, 'war is not an independent phenomenon, but the continuation of politics by different means'. An aggressor nation always has a political objective: more land, natural resources, or simply more power, and when these are taken by force others will seek to defend what they consider to be rightfully theirs. The war will only cease when conditions for diplomacy are achieved, and the warring nations can

settle upon a compro-

mise.

When Jesus said, 'blessed are the peacemakers', I wonder whether he had in mind the peace-keeping troops of the Roman Army. Pax Romana was brought about by quashing tribal in-fighting and insurrections, but that military force enabled economic stability and human flourishing. The world has not changed much in the past two-thousand years. We still need peacekeeping force in this world today to resist the military force of aggressors and create the conditions for diplomatic resolution to crises. But we work and pray for that day when all humanity will live in peace and safety, where the hungry and fed and all have access to justice. We remember the horrors of the world wars of the 20th century in order to learn from them as we face the challenges of our world today.

Lady Chapel update

Work has commenced on the Lady Chapel floor area. The original timber floor boards on the eastern side have been taken up and the joists showing considerable wood rot have been replaced with airdried oak timber. The intention is to relay the original flooring, which remains in good condition. At this stage all the joists affected were found to be resting on soil whereby the new joists have been laid on a water resistant membrane. Once this stage of the works is completed the central area of flooring will be examined for wood rot.

Crib/stable update

Work is underway for a replacement of the old Christmas crib/stable, which was damaged in last year's vestry fire and deemed unsuitable for future use. Local schools have been contacted and as a result three pupils from Sleaford Joint Sixth Form have designed a new stable and are now in the process of building the final design. Career of a former Assistant Curate

Horatio Spurrier was born in 1872, son of Thomas, farmer, at Barrow-on-Trent, Derbyshire. From 1856 to 1859, he studied at Oriel College, Oxford. - B.A. 1859. (He was nearly selected to row in the 1859 Boat Race!). Was ordained deacon in 1858 and priest in 1859, and was our curate in 1858.

He was then vicar of Shildon, County Durham from 1866. "In 1866, aged 34, he came north to Shildon and , unusually well liked for an Anglican vicar among the coalminers, he stayed." He was made a canon of Durham in 1901. In 1882, he took part against the Rev'd W.H.G. Stephens in a 'human' chess match on a board 15 yards square, "bellowing out orders to the pieces"! Shildon church was bult in 1868, Mr Spurrier tapping the dedicated in time for the season of Advent. It has been a joy working with the schools on this project and we have been very impressed with the way the pupils and their tutors have approached this task.

Market Place

Meetings with representatives from North Kesteven District Council (NKDC) have continued and one event which is being organized is to be held during the weekend of 21/22 December. Apart from NKDC arranging several activities, it is planned for the west facade of the church to be illuminated. During the weekend the church will offer teas, coffees and soup on both days. On the Saturday (21st) these will be served in the churchyard allowing Sleaford Choral Society to prepare the inside of the church for their evening concert.

Remembrance Sunday

The annual Remembrance Sunday Memorial Service will be a little different this year due to the restrictions imposed by the construction work on the Market Place. Limited access will be

foundation stone into place. "The £2,500 church came into use the following year, and Mr Spurrier remained as rector throughout his career. In 1887, he married Eleanor Cumby, the grand-daughter and heir of Captain William Pryce-Cumby, the hero of the 1805 Battle of Trafalgar, who lived in Heighington (DL5). Consequently, when he died, Mr Spurrier was buried in the churchyard.

Horatio's son, also Horatio, was appointed Vicar of Staindrop in 1923. His grandson, The Rev'd Horatio Sandys Cumby was appointed "Chaplain to the Forces, Second Class (temporary), Royal Army Chaplains Department" in January 1946.

I am sure other curates here followed fascinating careers. Perhaps I will unearth a few more somewhen. available for wreaths to be laid on the Memorial and Market Street will be used for the gathering of various military units and organisations. Space will be made available on the south side of Market Street for the general public. On the 11th November the traditional ceremony around the Memorial will take place inside St Denys Church. Many thanks go to the British Legion staff who have been able to adapt these important ceremonies because of the Market Place works.

TV screens

It has been suggested, and some research has been carried out, to consider installing one or two large TV screens within the body of the church. There are several benefits in having TV screens within the church as they will allow people who are sitting in areas offering limited visual impact to have a greater sense of being part of belonging. The current feeling is to have TV screens on stands rather than being fixed to a column. This would allow us to change the position of where to place the screens for whatever reason and also enable to store them securely. The PCC will be given an opportunity to decide if this is a project worth pursuing.
